

THE LATE REV. JAMES A. CULBERT (U.S.A.)

The Rev. James Culbert, aged 69, a retired priest of the Congregation of the Missions (Vincen-tian Fathers), died recently at St. Vincent's Seminary, 500 E. Chel-ten Avenue, Princeton, New Jersey, where he lived for the past three years.

Father Culbert, who retired in 1972 after 12 years as an assistant Pastor, was a native of Waterbury Conn. He attended Niagarar Univ-ersity and completed his theolog-ical studies at St. Vincent Semin-ary.

Following his ordination in May 1935 by Denis Cardinal Dougherty Father Culbert was assigned as a Missionary in China. He returned to America in 1944.

He is survived by two sisters: Sister Mary Anthony, of the Sisters of St. Ursula and Mrs. Mary Cooper.

Father Culbert's mother, form-erly Miss Kate Gilhooly, was a sister of Miss Margaret Gilhooly, Drumgólwa, Cloone. His father was a native of Monasterevan, Co. Kildare.

Surviving cousins of the late Fr. Culbert in Ireland are: Garda Sergeant Michael Kelly, Newtown Road, Wexford; Mr. Michael Kelly, Knockroosk, Gortvagh, Co. Leitrim; and Mr. Jim Kelly.

Sister Mary Anthony, Fr. Cul-ber't's sister was in Ireland last year, and visited her relatives. She teaches Spanish in New York University.

A concelebrated Mass of Christ-ian Burial was offered up for the late Fr. Culbert at the Chapel of St. Vincent's Seminary, and the burial took place to the adjoining cemetery.
